Context

The Master's Thesis (TFM) is understood as an overarching subject aimed at comprehensive assessment of specific and cross-cutting skills associated with the Master's. The aim of the Master's Thesis is to produce a supervised dissertation that applies and includes the knowledge, skills and approaches acquired throughout the programme, enabling assessment of students' professional, learning and initial research skills.

More specifically, the Master's Thesis aims to demonstrate that students have acquired the necessary skills to undertake original research into a specific topic related to literary and cultural studies or theoretical and applied linguistics. The overall goal is to acquire methodological tools to be able to undertake research into one of the language areas covered by the Master's in Modern Languages and Literatures, either from an experimental or applied perspective, or from a theoretical or expository approach. The Master's Thesis collates the knowledge, skills and approaches acquired throughout the Master's and must be in line with its specific objectives.

Ten credits are awarded for writing and defending the Master's Thesis.

Requirements

Essential

The Master's Thesis defence shall take place once students have passed 50 credits from the subjects on the Master's programme.





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Recommended

Students are recommended to contact the Master's Thesis coordinators on the selected pathway during the first semester (Dr Eva Pérez, coordinator for the Literary and Cultural Studies Pathway, and Dr Andrés Enrique, coordinator for the Theoretical and Applied Linguistics Pathway) and then contact the specialised lecturer in the topic they wish to research (see topic list in the contents section).

Teaching Methodology

- 1. Students are recommended to contact the specialised lecturer in the topic they wish to research and notify the Master's Thesis general coordinators, Dr Pérez (Literature) and Dr Enrique (Linguistics) about the selected thesis topic and tutor. Preferably, the thesis tutor will be a lecturer from the Department of Spanish, Modern and Classical Philology.
- 2. Once the title and contents have been agreed by the tutor and student, the student must access the Online Platform to fill out the Master's Thesis registration application form at the following address:

The Thesis Structure must be attached as a PDF document (max. 1,500 words) and include the following sections: title and tutor; reasoning for topic (state of play); objectives, methodology and expected results, and basic bibliography.

3. Thesis submission. The Master's Thesis structure shall generally include the following sections: introduction; objectives; hypothesis and/or research questions; state of play; method; results; discussion and conclusions; bibliographic references and appendices, always in line with the specific characteristics of the research topic and the particular guidelines set out by the thesis tutor.

The recommended maximum length for theses is approximately 15,000 words, excluding any appendices, and as per the particular guidelines set out by the tutor.

The thesis shall be submitted in PDF format (with the official cover: the mandatory format for the thesis COVER is as per the UIB Centre for Postgraduate Studies guidelines) via the Online Platform.

4. The Thesis defence shall be undertaken once students have passed 50 credits from the Master's subjects and the records for these subjects have been signed and submitted by the corresponding lecturers. The Thesis defence shall be viva voce before a panel. The thesis tutor shall notify Administration Services regarding the members of the panel and the date of the viva.

There will be a meeting about the thesis in the first term so that students can notify the general coordinators, Dr Eva Pérez (Literature and Culture) and Dr Andrés Enrique (Linguistics), regarding their selected topic. It is, therefore, the student's responsibility to notify the thesis coordinators about their selected topic and tutor. The general coordinators may also recommend a research topic to students, as well as possible tutor-lecturers.	0

Students will be provided with the subject schedule on the UIBdigital platform at the start of the semester. As a minimum, this schedule shall include the dates for the continuous assessment tests and for submission of work. In addition, the lecturer shall notify students as to whether the subject work plan shall be undertaken as per the schedule or via another method, including the Aula Digital platform.

Lecturers shall assess the student's written work. Once approved, the viva voce defence shall be held. The panel for the Master's Thesis shall comprise three lecturers at most with the thesis tutor being on the panel. Written work submitted to the panel members that contains serious shortcomings may be returned to the student before arranging the viva voce defence. The panel chair shall be required to attach a reasoned report. The student may correct the shortcomings in the Master's Thesis and re-submit it for another viva voce session.
